HONORÉ HERMÉS In what may be the ultimate fashion honor, Hermès has introduced a scarf inspired by the Ann & Gabriel Barbier-Mueller Museum in the Harwood District, which houses The Samurai Collection amassed by the Dallas-based Barbier-Muellers and their children over the past 25 years. The Parures de Samouraïs is a 90-by-90-cm silk twill scarf, available in 12 colorations, featuring a design by artist Aline Honoré that pays homage to the richly ornamented armor of the medieval Japanese warriors of the 14th and 18th century. "It is the combination of art and armor, the boundless creativity of the objects' forms, and the aesthetics used by these fierce and cultivated warriors that drew us in to assemble our collection," said Gabriel Barbier-Mueller. "Hermès transformed our sculptural pieces into beautiful silk textiles, incorporating key details from 14 of our select pieces, more importantly the mogamidō tōsei gusoku (armor) that serves as the focal point of the scarf."
